

Curriculum Vitae Dr. Hendrik E. Niemeijer

I specialized in European-Asian interactions in the Early Modern Period 1500-1800. After completing my PhD thesis (1996) at the Department of History at Vrije Universiteit Amsterdam on church and society of Batavia (Jakarta) during the 17th century, I participated in a KNAW project at Protestant Theological University Kampen on mission, education, and churches in the Moluccas. At Leiden University I was responsible for the VOC program "Towards A New Age of Partnership" (TANAP, 2000-2007).

In 2008 I settled permanently in Indonesia and specialized in digital history, digital conservation, and archive management. With the support of The Corts Foundation I digitized 1,2 million pages of VOC archives in the Arsip Nasional Republik Indonesia (ANRI) in Jakarta and developed www.sejarah-nusantara.anri.go.id. From 2012 to 2016 I taught maritime history at Diponegoro University, Semarang.

Since 2016 I have had my own business in archival software and digital heritage conservation. One of our main activities is helping Indonesian theological faculties and church organizations with developing digital documentation centres. We cooperate closely with the Shared Cultural Heritage Programme of the Nationaal Archief Nederland.

My current research focuses on the Reformed churches in Eastern Indonesia 17th and 18th centuries; the Protestant Church of the Netherlands Indies (PKNI, 1844-1950) and the Indonesian Community of Churches (PGI) and its members since 1950.

Published in 2015 at Huygens-ING - Institute for Dutch History:

A six-volume publication *Bronnen betreffende Kerk en School in de gouvernementen Ambon, Ternate en Banda ten tijde van de Verenigde Oost-Indische Compagnie, 1605-1795*. This publication in six volumes concerns the history of the Protestant missions, churches and schools in Eastern Indonesia (the Moluccas) during 1605-1799. I started researching this topic in 1996. The volumes include more than 957 mostly unknown documents (letters and reports) by Dutch and Indonesian protestant missionaries working in Eastern Indonesia in the 17th and 18th centuries. This work follows the work of Huber Jacobs SJ, *Documenta Malucensia* and *The Jesuit Maccassar Documents* collected from the Vatican archives covering the 16th and early 17th centuries.

This work (2.833 pages, 6,166 footnotes) took 19 years of research, meticulous transcription of fragile documents and careful annotation. During the process the co-author Dr. Th. van den End and I found several unknown printed devotional books and catechisms in old Malay. This

work also covers the history of the first Bible translations in the Malay language and the history of the first Bible translation in Portuguese (by *João Ferreira de Almeida*). This publication of these sources may be considered as one of the most extensive contributions to the History of Early Modern Christianity in Asia and the religious encounter between Europe and Asia.

This publication was funded by the **Royal Netherlands Academy of Sciences (KNAW)** and has been published in May 2015 by the ING/Huygens Institute.

Past Research

In 1991 I started exploring the collections of 2,5 kilometres of archives of the Dutch East India Company (VOC, 1602-1795) in the National Archives of Indonesia in Jakarta (ANRI) and the National Archive at The Hague. This is the largest archival collection on Early-Modern European-Asian Relations in its Global Context anywhere in the World. During about 22 years of research and project management I gradually have become one of the leading international experts on this collection. In 2007 I contributed to the publication of a new inventory (Brill Publ. Leiden).

In 2004 the VOC archives were registered by UNESCO into the Memory of the World Register. During 2010-2016 I was the programme leader of a Digital History project in Jakarta to place 1,1 million of scans online and make these accessible for researchers in cooperation with several departments of history of Indonesian universities.

For Asian-European History, this VOC-archive in Indonesia has an enormous potential for research into local, regional and intra-Asian trade relations and the formation of overseas trading communities, in particular Chinese and Indian trading communities in Southeast Asia.

Several international scholars have explored these archives further developed a research agenda that is able to combine Chinese, Portuguese, English and Dutch sources.

Some of my research and teaching at Leiden University concentrated on topics such like:

- Historiography 1: Historians of Southeast Asia and their utility of western archives (considerations on research methodologies, historical and 'archival' events).
- Historiography 2: 'autonomous history' inspired by growing national identities versus 'global history' inspired by western concepts; the concept of 'stranger king' in modern colonial historiography.
- 17th-18th Batavia as the dominant multi-ethnic and multi-religious Asian-European maritime city in Southeast Asia.
- International shipping to Batavia (Dutch shipping, the Chinese Tea and Porcelain Trade, English, Portuguese, French), European-Asian trading contacts; economic exchange as a vehicle of cultural exchange (shifting identities).
- The role of diplomacy, contracts, honour and protocol in the formation of the European power in Southeast Asia, in particular in the Malay-Indonesian archipelago.

My main specialism is the history of Christianity in Indonesia 1600-1950.

- Catholic Missions and the Protestantization of VOC territories (the Moluccas, Timor, Malakka, Colombo, Cochin) in its political and social (non-western) local contexts.
- The history of the *Protestantse Kerk van Nederlands-Indië* (PKNI) and its direct successors the GMIM, GPM, GPIB and GMIT.
- The history of the Indonesian Community of Churches (PGI, Persekutuan Gereja-gereja di Indonesia) since the 1950s.
